

Portland Nov 25th 1857

My Dear Father

I received your letter  
of the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. last wednesday, you say that the arms  
are intended for four inch boxcing, they say that  
the arms are not stout enough for the work  
that you will want to do with it, they wait  
to put in five inch boxcing and make a  
new set <sup>of</sup> ~~wheels~~ <sup>axles</sup> to fit them to, another  
thing, the <sup>wheels</sup> that you spoke of that is the  
height of them, they say that in soft road the  
waggon will run hard, and I told them to make  
them, the front wheels three feet high and the  
hind ones three and a half, but the wheels I mind  
nothing about, if they make new ones and the  
wheels that height it will cost you 30 or 35 dollars  
each, but they will wait till you can send word  
whether you will want them in that way  
(or not,) you may think that I am trying  
to get more work done for them but I am  
not, I want you to have a good wagon  
built, if ~~you~~ want it as you first did



that in the way it will be, I am glad it heat  
that you have a school there, I would try and  
study here at night but we are hatching, and I  
can't do it they make to much noise there is six  
of us hatching together, three of the bosses is  
with us, another thing when I work 10 ours in  
the day I feel something like going to bed, you  
say keep out of bad company I will try and  
do so I have been in very respectable company so  
far, and expect to remain it you say that you are  
going to Cyrus have four hundred bushels  
of apples I wish that I had a few of them  
here but it is no use to <sup>morn</sup> move over apples  
with I might if had some it would not hatched  
them down there is no one to burn out my self,  
apples are worth from 20 to 25 cents per pound that  
is green fruit I think he will do well with  
his fruit.

If you are going to feed me on  
hot dung ~~bakes~~ when I come up home, I am  
not so sure about coming,

I would like very  
well to see your mother down here some  
time this winter, Mrs Jacob would like very  
much to see mother, she told me to have her come down



and I told her that I ~~would~~ <sup>had</sup> certainly  
do it if I could,

I am getting along very  
well with my trade. Simon & I make at  
the bed Iron rivets, iron neck yokes, make lock  
chains, and do up most of the work after  
they make it. I am getting along as fast as  
could be expected.

Mr Jacobs has not gone to the  
shores. He expects to go on the next steamer,  
I suppose that you have heard nothing from  
Ephraim since he left. I have not <sup>(dear)</sup> ~~not~~ <sup>yet</sup>  
told Harry Eden to not slide off before I  
come up, if she does I will not get any reward  
for her.

Well I believe that I will not <sup>(conclude)</sup>  
writ again more at present so I will conclude  
with saying give my regards to all of the folks  
tell George to write as I have not much time  
he must not wait for one,
