

Dear Sir

Upon the return of Mr Howard from the conference  
I was strongly impressed with the idea that he had sought to  
convey to the members of that body an unfavorable impression  
in regard to the manner of conducting affairs upon this reservation  
and that more than an ordinary year had been manifested  
in placing his own penitence as well as his devotion to the  
cause in which we were all engaged. Upon reaching  
Dayton where I still have a few friends, that fact was  
made more apparent and I became satisfied that a kind  
of conspiracy or combination had been formed between  
Mr Howard and Post Shipleys with direct reference  
to displacing me and securing the position for himself.  
It is needless now to go into detail in setting forth  
all the circumstantial and direct evidences of this  
conspiracy. To my mind it is conclusive and  
whilst I am free to admit that the employees are  
not all such as might be desired or such as we hope  
to secure. They are not by any means that class  
of desperately wicked men that appears to have been represented  
and whilst the complaints may be just in some respects, has  
he fulfilled in all things the obligations resting upon him  
if not he should not be the medium through which to give

so much a culling in the short comings of others  
it was well known by me, to those among my appointed  
that I had not been accustomed to take a leading part  
in religious exercises & I felt this lack of competency  
and hence sought to select a person well qualified  
to do that service. believing Mr Howard to be such  
I unhesitatingly gave him the best position at my disposal.  
It was expected that he would take the lead in all religious  
exercises - aid the arrangement and encouragement of schools  
and the general moral training of all upon the reservation.  
Hitherto we have had no preaching to whites or Indians  
except one sermon by Father Doane. No major meetings  
or claps exercises - we have established a Sunday  
school to which Mr Howard has been present three  
times. Now if there has been an omission or failure  
to carry out the expectations of the church on my part  
on their employes should not that fact have  
urged him to push forward and labour harder  
to turn the tide in a proper direction and thus  
at least <sup>perform</sup> the duties expected of his hands, rather  
than to make that omission the basis of complaint  
against others? The claims to have done but his

duty and it may be that my mental faculties are so greatly impaired as to incapacitate me to judge correctly of ones duty but it does appear to me that duty did not require him to give publicly outside of the conference or members of the church to unfavorable representations not only in a religious point of view but to the certainty of having managed the finances in a way to swamp us and leave the employees without means of means - besides seeking to create an impression in my mind that the line of policy to be marked out by the committee to whom the whole subject had been referred as well as the declarations of Mr. Morris and Father Miller, would be such as that, with my former conversation with him I would feel compelled to resign and thus leave him in charge - for by his representations he was placed here as missionary with an understanding

that in the event of my withdrawal he was to supersede me and he felt so sure of <sup>that</sup> event, that he even ventured to have an interview with my secretary Mr Chapman, to inform him that if he assumed duties he wanted he retained, although he is not a member of any religious denomination and in conversations with Indians intimated that it was possible he might be their God - now aside from the humiliating fact that one's every word and act is watched and tried into and probably with a view to give an unbearable rebuking, it is mortifying in the extreme when that part is played by a former friend and brother, not only in the church but in nearly all the Societies or organizations established for the purpose of enlightening and benefiting his fellow man - one almost loses his confidence in human nature - The position of an agent here

under the most favourable circumstances, is a trying and laborious task, a constant strain upon the mental as well as the physical faculties. And <sup>The reason</sup> why so many are labouring for these positions can only be accounted for upon the ground that they are ignorant of the duties imposed, or indifferent to the objects to be attained.

The almighty dollar appears to me to be the controlling element, cover it up and plaster it over as we may, that lies at the foundation. I have no wish to magnify the causes of complaint against these parties in fact so far as Mr Howard is concerned I myself am ready to forgive and forget and return to work in harmony and peace. But it is questionable whether my family and friends here will do so - and as to Pastor Shippy, my only reason for tolerating him one hand, is the fact that we have no other one to fill his place and there are quite a number of sick.

I commer this letter on Saturday - On Sunday for the first time Mr Howard preached for us a 12 - in connection with the Sunday school, notice was given and at 4 P.M he preached to the Indians. we had a large congregation and an interesting time and a worth inculcated that of hope and belief will eventuate in much good -

Now under all the circumstances and surroundings

I am forced to come to the conclusion that it would be  
better for me to withdraw from this service. leaving  
the reports put in consultation as to my being in my  
dotage may be verified. I know my inability  
to do all I could wish once as I attack no  
pecuniary or political importance to the position  
and feel that I can injur<sup>y</sup> life better without than  
with it, I hope and trust your committee will  
take immediate steps to relieve me - you have  
no wish now would it be just to ask me to  
remain the first year and labour under all the  
disadvantages and do the amount of work required to  
inaugurate the new policy, passing the way for some one  
to step in and take the harness after the fields have  
been gleaned. I am not now disposed to make any  
apology for not securing the services in all cases  
of religious or professed Christians other than to say  
I never met with one to put my hand upon the proper  
material - persons looked at qualifications from a  
different stand point - in some instances reasons were  
assigned why positions were sought that were conclusive  
with me that they were disqualifed or unsuited  
for the positions - but time will remedy these evils  
if reason and justice be the rule of action
