William L. Finley, well known author, naturalist, and lecturer, will leave January 5 on his 24th extended lecture tour through the East. His new series of motion picture reels entitled, "Where Rolls the Oregon," will feature this state as the most beautiful recreational area in the country. The most attractive scenic shots that can be found along the Oregon coast, the summit of the Cascades to Crater Lake, in the deep gorge of the Columbia, and in the wide area to the east, have been connected with the sport of angling, packing, and motoring. Combined with these are pictures of wild life for which Mr. Finley is famousremarkable shots of bear, deer, elk, and other big game, myriads of sea fowl on the cliffs, and the limitless numbers of ducks, geese, and wading birds in the lake region of southern Oregon.

Mr. Finley's show, scheduled in all of the larger cities from here to Portland, Maine, will be an invitation to all those who love outdoor life to spend a summer in Oregon. His motion pictures will be the main attraction at the annual banquet attended by sportsmen from all parts of the country. He will also be the main speaker at the New England game conference in Boston on January 26.

Other places where Mr. Finley will speak are the University Club and Field Museum of Chicago, and the Chicago Geographic society; Washington University of St. Louis; the World Adventure Series of the Detroit Institute of Arts, Pittsburgh Academy of Science and Art, and the Carnegie Museum; Geographic Players, Inc., of New York City, and the American Museum of Natural History; the Boston City club; and other organizations throughout the country.

Also included in his lecture dates are the University club and Field museum, Chicago; Chicago Geo-graphic society; Washington univer-sity, St. Louis; World Adventure Series of the Detroit Institute of Arts; Pittsburgh Academy of Science and Art; the Carnegie museum; the Geographic Players, Inc., and Ameri-can Museum of Natural History, New York city, and the Boston City club.
