TO LA SUN CLUB IS NAT-
IONALLY KNOWN EDITOR**

November 1927 issue of
American Magazine features
Portland's leading citizen

When one of the Nation's lead-
ing magazines selected Mr. Irvine
as the subject of an article in
its columns, they were no doubt
governed by his accomplishments,
especially in light of what is
usually recognized as a difficult
handicap; blindness.

Mr. Irvine almost makes one
believe it is no handicap, but we
all know what a tremendous obsta-
cle it is to the average person.
"Worrying is the most difficult
use you can make of your mind--
and I'll tell you why," says Mr.
Irvine, in the Nov. 127 issue of
the American Magazine... Now, when
you worry, your imagination gets
away from you. You find yourself
looking at all the things that
might happen.... That's why it's
useless to worry. Try to reason.
Worrying is just wild guessing a-
gainst odds..

Mr. Irvine came to Portland
from Corvallis where he was editor
of the Corvallis Times, in 1907,
and is now Editor of the Oregon
Daily Journal.
